- 1. What is the title of the painting and who is the artist?
- 2. Explain why you chose the painting by commenting on two specific aspects of it. You might look at use of colour or how the image portrays war.

Once you have made your selections, get into groups of four to share your results. Were there any paintings that received more attention than others? As a class, find out which painting was most popular.
